Easter, spring, bunnies and chocolate eggs

I am looking forward to spring. I long for the time that the daffodils shine their lights across the banks and pathways, heralding ever-so-slightly warmer weather. It is also time for Easter, a bit later than usual this year, but set according to Passover and the phases of the moon.

It's sadly also a time for a slew of nonsense to crop up, usually on social media, about the supposed pagan origins of Easter. People in tweed jackets with elbow patches and bad hair speak earnestly about how early Christians 'stole' the spring equinox, adopted the ideas behind pagan goddess Eastre and a Roman god to craft the whole idea of virgin birth, death and resurrection of Jesus. I have heard these assertions for many years now, but they are false. As I was often reminded when studying statistics, 'Correlation does not imply Causation'. Just because there are correlations in understanding between different cultures, does not mean that the Christian church took their ideas from other places.

The Christian story of these ideas is a direct product of the events surrounding the death and crucifixion of Jesus. They rely on the reinterpretation of Old Testament scripture to add flesh to their theological bones, so that the letters of Paul in this regard (particularly 1 Corinthians 15, written about 20 years after the death of Jesus) refer to resurrection in the context of the witness of the apostles and to the Jewish scriptures, and not with any reference to other cultures. While the stories of death and resurrection may not be unique to our faith, they do not rely on other sources for their inclusion. These stories are part of the reported witness of the apostles and even the witness of Paul, who claimed to have met with the risen Jesus on the road to Damascus.

Our story of resurrection at the first Easter is not rooted in the myth of a cultural god, but based on the witness of people who claimed to have seen, walked with, eaten with and talked with a risen Jesus. None of this is easy, or even possible to explain. Yet the story remains deeply attractive, even today. Death is the final, great unknown in a world where so much has been quantified and explained; where the fog of

superstition has been lifted off so many of the old, deep fears. The story of the man who conquered death still holds the power to amaze and attract. It is made all the more wonderful when we are invited to be part of his story, to become a conqueror of death along with the risen Christ.

So, back to the daffodils ... as we see them, we know that winter's grip is weakening, and that the inevitability of spring will soon sing its symphony of new life to the world. So too may hope be rekindled in our hearts. Soon, we will again sing hymns which declare 'O death, where is thy sting? O grave, where is thy victory?' All the rest - the eggs, the hats, the chicks, the bunnies — only add a bit of sparkle to the story and take nothing away from the awesomeness of it, nor do they detract from the deep love inherent in the invitation to be part of that victory.

ECO CHURCH - AN UPDATE : FEBRUARY 2025

The broader picture

The year 2024 was not a good one from the climate change point of view. Elections in the UK, US and elsewhere have resulted in governments who have watered down eco commitments in the face of solid evidence that climate change is real. Witness the very severe floods, fires and hurricane type events which have had a huge economic impact. Despite these political setbacks, there is a lot of good work that is continuing to find technical ways to mitigate the effects of climate change (such as carbon dioxide capture improving battery storage).

It is ironic that, though globally temperatures have continued to rise, to many of us in the UK it felt that 2024 was a relatively cool year. Just one of the quirks of the changing climate.

Despite these global issues, we can influence what is going on by working together. Here are some current initiatives that Beckenham Methodist Church are pursuing.

Eco Church – Silver Award

Last year we gained an A Rocha Eco Church Bronze Award and we have been working out how we can progress to the Silver Award. There are around 100 challenges divided into 5 categories. We have to meet silver status in each of the five categories. We have achieved silver in two of the categories but in the three others we have quite a bit of work to do. They are:

- Land and Nature: encouraging bio-diversity
- Community and Global Engagement : challenges that support community action
- Lifestyle: challenges that support lifestyle changes.

If you would like to know more about these challenges, please contact David Bishop for more information. We would always welcome more help in the quest to achieve the remaining challenges.

Finally we can report progress with the installation of **photo voltaic solar panels** on two of the hall roofs. We have accepted a proposal from a firm called Prostar Energy to install a system consisting of 30 panels spread across the Bevington Hall roof and the newly refurbished flat roof of the Epworth Room. The system should reduce our electricity bill significantly. The savings come from not having to import electricity when our power needs are met by the panels and the payments we receive when we export electricity to the grid when the panels are generating more than we need. The predicted payback period for this investment is 7 years but this figure depends on how much electricity prices change over the next few years.

Hopefully we might see the installation completed in 2025 but various permissions will be needed including planning permission from Bromley Council, permission from the central Methodist Property Board and a check that the local electricity network is able to accept the electricity we export.



DAILY HOPE continues

DailyHOPE was initially launched in April 2020 as a response by the Church of England, <u>Faith in Later Life</u> and Connections at Holy Trinity Church in Claygate to support older people who would not be able to access online worship during lockdown.

In 2023, Faith in Later Life took over the development and ownership of the line, but its aim remained the same; to ensure that the spiritual life of older people could continue to flourish. Data from that year showed that DailyHOPE received almost 100,000 calls.

After closing at the end of January 2024, it has been announced that the service has re-started. As DailyHOPE is relaunched and refreshed, Christians are being encouraged to share the free telephone number – **0800 804 8044** – in their church and wider communities.

The plan for DailyHOPE is to further develop the range of content and content providers in order to appeal to a wider audience of Christians, as well as older people exploring faith for the first time, and be a useful resource for those unable to attend church in person, and who are without online access to spiritual comfort.

Bible verse of the year

"Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God". Philippians 4:6

This was voted the most popular Bible verse of 2024 by the YouVersion Bible App, with higher engagement with that verse than others. It was written by Paul to the first church that he established on European soil, whilst imprisoned, facing hardship and possible death. It teaches us to have courage and confidence in times of trouble and to trust God to carry our burdens.

Finally

Don't forget the clocks go forward by one hour at 1am on 30th March. (Clocks "spring forward" in spring to mark th beginning of British Summertime.

If you usually have difficulty in adjusting the Sleep Council suggest that a few nights before the clocks are due to go forward start going to bed a little earlier eachnight and wake up 10-15 minutes earlier each morning. The theory is that by Sunday you will already be adjusted!
