



#### **SALVATION AND OTHER SHINY THINGS**

This is a Christmas message, even if it may not look like it at first. I am a big fan of Christmas, for all the usual reasons. It's a season where, typically, people are nicer than normal to one another, a time when there is a focus on family and friends and a sharing of gifts. The decorations are also quite nice, and Laura and I went through central London just before last Christmas to admire all the beautiful lights. Theologically there is also a good reason to like the season – salvation!

I can't quite understand why people who do not follow Jesus are sometimes so against the idea of salvation. Like so many of the things around this time, it is a gift, it is sparkly, and above all, it is freely given to anyone who wants it.

I suppose the primary reason that people who are against the idea of salvation may have, is that it means that we are sinners who are unable to save ourselves. To anyone who claims that salvation (redemption/ the achievement of full humanity) can be achieved without an external agent, I would simply point to the economic, social, and spiritual mess the world is currently in. Before anyone goes harking back to 'when things were better', they weren't better – they were different, but still just as bad. We have had thousands of years as civilised humans to evolve to the point of being at peace with one another, caring for the vulnerable and worshipping (or not) in a respectful way. We're sadly no closer to this goal than we were thousands of years ago.

Why I said that salvation is appropriate for the season is that it is a gift. Our gift-giving at this season supposedly harks back to the acknowledgement that God gifted the world with the promise of salvation through the person and work of Jesus. We then took to gifting one another with presents to echo that self-offering of God. There is a crucial aspect to gift-giving that is seldom mentioned though – for something to be a gift, it needs to be received. The purpose of a gift does not lie in the purchase, or wrapping, or delivery of something ... it lies in it being received by someone. For so many people, Christianity has been something that they grew up with, fell into by chance or otherwise took on. The purpose of the Christian faith lies in the willingness of the individual to accept salvation as a gift from God. We need to acknowledge that neither our own strength, nor the philosophies and wisdom of our age, nor our relative social success are, in themselves, sufficient to make us fully human (i.e. to discover and express the image of God which is inherent in our being). We need an external agent to act on our lives, broaden our horizons (to allow us to include eternity in our vision) and show us how to become fully human.

I know that to describe salvation as 'sparkly' will irritate some people, but what I mean is that it is attractive. It has a lustre to it that invites us to turn it over in our minds, to look at our reflection in its brilliant surface. The promise of salvation through Christ is so much more than a 'How To' for life on earth. It embraces the unknown vastness of space and time and invites us to become part of their eternal dance. We become part of a bigger story — not just the earthly story, but part of something that both embraces it and extends beyond it.

How dull must people be to turn away from the offer to explore the possibility of being part of such an extensive and positive story? Salvation lifts us from fear of the unknown, however that may manifest itself, to a place where we are part of a never-ending story of inter-galactic love.

Finally, the offer of salvation is for all. We cannot conceive of the generosity of a God who will invite everyone to their feast. Whenever we may try to stop Jesus from talking to the despised, the downtrodden or the socially unacceptable, he simply steps past us and embraces them. Then he turns to us and reminds us that we have received no more, nor any less salvation than any of them. The work of salvation may be greater in one case than another, the cost may be higher in one case than another, but the gift remains the same. It is an invitation to be made whole and to journey through life and death as part of a bigger, more beautiful story than we ever could conceive.

A blessed Christmas to you and yours from me and mine.

#### **OUR VISIT TO TOKYO**

Jacky and I have just had four weeks in Japan with our son and his family. We've been to Japan several times before but this time we stayed exclusively in Tokyo to concentrate on the many aspects of that fascinating city.



Tokyo is a city of about 35M people. It is well organised, clean, efficient. The Japanese are a disciplined people in many ways; which side of the pavement or escalator to walk is very important, as is always waiting for the Green man before

crossing the road. When waiting for a train the place to stand is marked, very important at rush hour. And no-one eats, drinks or talks on a mobile phone on the train; that would be considered very rude and inconsiderate. People are very helpful to visitors who look lost. If you're standing trying to make sense of a map or one of the many information boards spread around the city it won't be long before a very polite Japanese comes up and says 'May I help you?' The trains run on time, they pull up precisely where they should on the platform and the on-board information appears in English as well as the three Japanese alphabets. As a result it's easy to get around Tokyo on the subway system though it's also easy to get lost in some of the stations if your concentration slips for a moment or two. There are stories, apocryphal but almost credible, of people being lost in Shinjuku station for hours and days at a stretch.

The old Tokyo was largely destroyed in the Second World War. The great rebuilding effort began in the late 1940s and the city now is noticeably more modern in its architecture and layout than, say, London or Paris. The city also famously stands on a geological faultline and earthquakes are a constant feature of life. It's not unusual to feel a tremor or to see the pictures on the wall start to sway. The earthquake regulations are updated constantly and strict building regulations govern the construction of the huge towers that form the skyline. Our son works on the 30th floor of a tower overlooking the Imperial Palace gardens; the tower is built to sway when the earth moves. It does sway and no-one thinks it out of the ordinary. They know that they will get the next big earthquake one day but until then no-one gets excited.



Most Japanese people are atheist in the sense that they don't have a concept of a personal God who is to be worshipped. They do, however, have a strong spiritual tradition expressed in formal gardens, and in the many Shinto shrines and

Buddhist temples which are scattered throughout the city, often tucked away on corners or in a side street, barely noticed by visitors, or crouching at the foot of some huge tower. Some of the shrines, however, are themselves very large, very old and treasured symbols of Japan's history and spiritual legacy. The Meiji Jingu shrine, for example, is a national monument much visited by Japanese as well as by tourists. The huge Kamakura Buddha is another symbol of Japan's spiritual history. Christianity is a very small presence; less than 2% of the population are Christian, despite Christian missionaries being present in Japan since the Jesuits first reached Yokohama in the 16th century. The Jesuits do have one success to their name: the Roman Catholic cathedral in Tokyo was constructed in the 1950s and is a masterpiece in steel and concrete with the most amazing acoustics. We were lucky enough to be there when a choir was rehearsing and the sound was truly ethereal.

We were in Tokyo for family reasons of course. Our son married a Japanese girl, Yuko, and their life with their two children, Maya 11 and Kazuya 8, is in Tokyo. We enjoyed meals and games like Monopoly and Cluedo. We watched sport practices like volleyball and more cultural pursuits like taiko drumming. We had a family meal with Yuko's parents - they speak little English and we have very little Japanese. Our granddaughter was translator/interpreter and kept the conversation going. The meal was traditionally Japanese; it had endless courses using chopsticks and all seeming to consist of raw fish until, blessedly, spoons came with the ice cream.

The trip was hugely enjoyable and we were very fortunate with the weather; the average temperature was in the mid 20s until early November. We're not sure when we'll be able to go again but ideas are being discussed already.


